

# MUMC At-Home Worship:

November 1, 2020

Today's worship ties together two threads: a final word in our series on generosity and the celebration of All Saint's Day. Long a part of church tradition, All Saint's Day is set aside in the church year to remember those who have died over the previous year and celebrate that they are now living in the full presence of God. As we remember the witness of their lives, we find encouragement to live faithfully and follow on the path they have already walked. This year, I invite us to consider how the saints in the great cloud of witnesses invested in us and how we might generously give to those who come after us.

*If available, place a candle in the center of your gathering space and light it with this prayer:*

Almighty God, in whom the saints rest: grant us the grace to follow the saints in all virtue and holiness, until we come to those inexpressible joys which you have prepared for those who truly love you. Amen.

**Naming the Saints:** speak aloud the names of those from your family or community who have died over the past year, pausing between names for a time of silent remembrance. Pray:

Holy God, whose loving presence reaches across both heaven and earth, hold in us the sure promise of resurrection as surely as you hold the saints who have gone before us. Amen.

**New Testament Reading:** Ephesians 1:11-23

The word of God for the people of God.

**Thanks be to God.**

**Reflect:**

1. The CEB translation of this passage from Ephesians as provided on the back chooses to say "God's own people" when other translations say "saints." How do you feel about the idea that you are counted among the saints? Does seeing ourselves and those around us as saints provide a comfort or challenge?
2. This passage speaks about God's power at great length. Why might it be important to highlight God's power? What difference does it make in your life to know of God's might?
3. The author's prayer for the Ephesians and for us is to see "the hope of God's call," which seems to describe placing our sights on a heavenly inheritance promised to us and living accordingly. How might the assurance of a spiritual inheritance change how we live our day-to-day lives?

**Ephesians 1:11-23 (CEB)**

We have also received an inheritance in Christ. We were destined by the plan of God, who accomplishes everything according to his design. We are called to be an honor to God's glory because we were the first to hope in Christ. You too heard the word of truth in Christ, which is the good news of your salvation. You were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit because you believed in Christ. The Holy Spirit is the down payment on our inheritance, which is applied toward our redemption as God's own people, resulting in the honor of God's glory.

Since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all God's people, this is the reason that I don't stop giving thanks to God for you when I remember you in my prayers. I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, will give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation that makes God known to you. I pray that the eyes of your heart will have enough light to see what is the hope of God's call, what is the richness of God's glorious inheritance among believers, and what is the overwhelming greatness of God's power that is working among us believers. This power is conferred by the energy of God's powerful strength. God's power was at work in Christ when God raised him from the dead and sat him at God's right side in the heavens, far above every ruler and authority and power and angelic power, any power that might be named not only now but in the future. God put everything under Christ's feet and made him head of everything in the church, which is his body. His body, the church, is the fullness of Christ, who fills everything in every way.
